

Happy Talk Mindful Moments

Happy Talk Mindful Moments are a chance to take a time out and to settle or energise your brain and body. Learning to pay attention can build great listening and learning skills. In these times it is normal to feel a little worried, and so a Happy Talk Mindful Moment is a great way to stay calm.



Listening Carefully Mindful Moment

Close your eyes and take a minute: sit still and take some deep breaths in and out. Imagine that you are a librarian. Librarians must be alert and know what is happening in their library. A library is a place that is often quiet. This allows us to take a quiet moment and notice what is going on around us. Now that you are relaxed you will notice that there is lots going on in your busy library. What things can you imagine seeing and hearing? Are people reading books and the newspaper? Are they having a chat? Can you hear typing on the computer? Can you see a librarian stacking the shelves with books? Can you see someone doing their homework?

The next time you are in the library take a quiet and slow walk around and see what you can notice. Sit on a chair and watch people for a few moments and you will see too: libraries are busy places!





Telephone Messages

A Librarian has many jobs including answering the phone and passing on information to others such as staff and library members. In this game we are going to do the same.

We will pass on a message to our family or friends.

This game is a really good way to practice remembering.

How to Play (This game is like Chinese Whispers!)

- 1. Get a group together (as many people as possible!) You can turn off your phone and use it as a prop! Or if you really want one person can go in the other room and really call the 'librarian'.
- 2. The the 'librarian' will 'answer' the phone. The caller must think of a funny message.
- 3. They will pass the message on to the person next to them and so on until the message is passed along to everyone.
- 4. The last person to receive the message says what they heard out loud.









What does a Librarian do?

I welcome people to the library and make sure they know we are happy to see them!

"Welcome!"

In Ireland, Librarians mostly work in Public Libraries, but we also work in Hospitals, Prisons, Universities and Colleges, and in the Law Library of Ireland.

(Did you know there is a Law Library of Ireland?)



I help people find books, and I recommend books! Sometimes people don't know what books they're looking for until they talk to me!

I make sure that all the books are on the right shelf for people to find.
An organised Library is a good Library!

Some people come to the library to do their homework. It's a great place to learn.

I help people find out facts and information if they need help for a project or their homework.


The funny thing about Librarians is; we love to say goodbye to books, we love when you take books home to read! I help people take books out of the library. We use a scanner and all the information is saved on our computers. I can check who took out what books and when they will return them to the library. In Ireland we are very lucky; even if you bring your books back late, there are no late fees! We want to make sure you keep coming back!

Every Librarian Needs a Bookmark!


Here are some ideas for different types of bookmarks:

Let's Make a Corner Bookmark!

To make a corner bookmark you will need a scissors, glue and a square of paper.



How to Make a Corner Bookmark:

Fold the origami paper diagonally on both sides.



Fold into a triangle



Hold the top of the triangle and fold it towards the bottom of the triangle (to the centre).



Crease well.

Hold the left corner and fold it towards the bottom centre of the triangle.







Do the same with the other corner. Crease well.



Unfold both ends.



Grab hold of the left corner and fold it towards the top of the triangle. Crease.



Do the same with the other corner.



Tuck in the left "flap" into the pocket.



Do the same with the other.





Get creative and decorate the bookmark whatever way you like.



Sight Words!

There are 220 Sight Words in the English Language!

A <u>Sight Word</u> is a word you know <u>immediately</u> when you see it; you don't have to sound it out or work it out.

Examples of Sight Words are:

he and the if

Did your brain know these words immediately when you saw them? That's because they're <u>Sight Words!</u>

Your child is learning these words every day in school and when they read! Over 50% of the words we read are <u>Sight Words</u>.

Imagine what a head start you are giving your child by practicing some of these 220 words.

You can find all of these words online.

They are separated into lists called the Dolch Lists.

We will play some games to practice Sight Words!

Here we go!







I Spy Sight Words

For this game, all you need is to look at a page of writing/print. It can be from your favourite book or from a newspaper/magazine or a page of homework. So long as there is writing on the page it will do! You will also need your phone or a pen and paper.

We are going play "I spy..." looking for sight words. This is a great bedtime game, or a great game for when you just want to snuggle and take a quiet moment on the couch.

On your phone or a piece of paper show your child the Sight Word you choose and say to your child...

"I spy 'said' on this page..." and wait for them to find the sight word and point to it!

It is important you show your child the Sight Word (in this case 'said') on a piece of paper, or on your phone first. Older children might have these words in their head already, but showing them gives them a head start. For younger children, let them look for a word they can already see on a piece of paper or on your phone, and so they are matching words. This way they are learning the shape and pattern of the word and turning it into a 'Sight Word'; a word they recognise immediately when they see it!

If you are using a newspaper or magazine you can draw a circle around the word. You can give hints to help. "I spy 'said' at the bottom of the page."



Comics: These books tell their story through pictures and words togher. Lots of Superhero Stories are comics.






Picture Only Books: These books only have pictures and have NO words! That means you have to use your imagination!

of funny jokes!









Different Types of Books



Feeling Books: These books make you think about the different feelings that you have using pictures and words.



Novels: These stories have lots of writing in them and can be short or long! They sometimes have pictures but not always!










Library Facts: Did you know?

Librarians used to have their own style of handwriting called "Library Hand"!





More About the Library!

What is a Call Number?

All <u>Print Books</u> in the library are given a <u>Call Number</u>, usually found on the book spine. The <u>Call Number</u> shows what the book is about and acts like the book's address on the library's shelves or the Library Stacks.

What are Print Books?

Print Books are books that are printed on paper. They are books you can hold and feel and even smell! Lots of books now are not Print Books, they are <u>Digital</u>
Books!

What are the Library Stacks?

The Library Stacks are a storage area for books and not a reading area. Sometimes in a library you can see rows and rows of shelves and shelves of books: these are the stacks. Some of the stacks are hidden and in back rooms of the library and you might have to make a request for a book from the stacks!

What are Digital Books?

Lots of books now are also available digitally e.g. on your phone, tablet, computer! If you join the Library you can access digital and audio books online through the Borrow Box App on your phone or tablet!









Meet the People Who Make Books!

When a book is being made, lots of different people work at different stages before we see it in the library!

Let's meet these people!

<u>Author:</u> The Author is the person who writes the words of a book making the story. They can also be called a writer.



<u>Illustrator</u>: The Illustrator is the person who draws the pictures for the books that help to tell the story.



Editor: The Editor checks the book to make sure there are no mistakes. They check facts, spelling and other parts to make sure it is correct. They move the parts of the book around until they get the best fit for all the part.







Some more People!

<u>Publisher:</u> The publisher pays for books to be made and then earns money when the book sells. They are usually the one who pays the author and the printer. The editor often works for the Publisher. The Publisher gets the book ready to be made and sends it to be printer.



<u>Printer:</u> The Printer prints copies of the book for shops and libraries. They stick all the pages together and put on the book cover. They put the books in boxes to send them out to book shops and warehouses.





Book Shop Owner: The Book Shop Owner works in the book shop to sell the book. Sometimes they invite the Author to come and read from their book in the book shop so people can meet them.





<u>Librarian</u>: The Librarian works in the library checking out books, organising bookshelves and helping people search for information.




Make a Story Roll

In this game we are making a Story Roll. A Story Roll is drawn and written on a roll of paper, like a scroll. To tell the story, unroll the Story Roll bit by bit! Let's get busy!

You will need:

- Empty rolls from toilet paper or kitchen paper.
- Sheets of white paper
- Crayons/Markers
- Tape or glue
- Ribbon, string or wool



What to do:

- 1. Using the <u>empty</u> toilet or kitchen paper roll cut 4-6 sheets of paper to fit the size (height) of the roll.
- 2. Tape/glue the pages together to form one long sheet of paper
- 3. Tape/glue the end of the long sheet to the paper roll
- 4. Roll it up and tie it closed with ribbon/yarn/string
- 5. Pick a story e.g. 'My Rocket Ship', 'My Trip to the Zoo', 'The Monkey's Shoes', 'The Giraffe's Scarf', My Trip to the Dentist', 'My Covid Diary', 'My Family', 'A Letter for my Grandad'

Don't forget: for good stories you need:

Good Characters and SOMETHING has to happen!!!

- 6. Unroll the paper and start writing your story using your imagination!
- 7. Once your story is finished, you can start illustrating (drawing pictures) on the story roll!
- 8. Roll back up the story and tie it up.
- 9. Don't forget: on the roll write the title of the story, the names of the author and illustrator. Now, it's your own story!





Mind the Gap & Stop the Bus!

Mind the Gap!

1. One person starts saying the alphabet in their head. Another person says 'Stop the Bus!' when they want and whatever letter the first person is on in their head is the letter for the first turn at the game, for example 'B'.



2. Go around in a cirle and everyone must think of as many things that are in a library beginning with the letter 'B' eg. Blue pen, Books, Bookshelf etc. But, mind the gap! If you cannot think of a word you're out!





Newspaper Art

This is a fun, creative way to get painting while using old, torn bits of newspaper, magazines, envelopes or cardboard!

What you need:

- Old bits of newspaper
- Paint/Markers/Crayons
- Paintbrushes
- Container for paint
- Pot of water for cleaning brushes
- Apron (so your child's clothes don't get dirty!)

What to do:

- 1. Start by tearing your newspaper into different shapes.
- 2. Get your child thinking of what they want to paint.
- 3. It can be related to something from their favourite book (like a favourite character/favourite place).
- 4. Get your paint/markers in different colours.
- 5. Hang the artwork to dry somewhere if you used paint and you can hang it up on the walls/fridge when dry!
